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
STUDENT RESEARCH GRANTS

It's exciting to see the BSA continue to support student research! Even in a period of financial hardship for the society, we appreciate the continued support of students. Total investment in student grants has increased significantly over time, which we believe maintains high student engagement with the organization and fosters a commitment to BSA long-term. We understand that some of the funding we offer is dependent on fundraising, and we hope BSA will continue to support these high funding levels in the long-term.

STUDENT MEMBERSHIP

In 2023, BSA had the second highest number of Student Members (972), after a record 2021 (989). Student members continue to make up ~31% of total membership, staying at the record high from 2021. 64% of students had General membership, 33% had a 3 year membership, and 3% had a Chapter membership.



These trends continue to reflect the high student engagement in the society and highlight the importance of the student population for the society, both for student membership and for conversions from student to other membership types.

We hope to continue to increase student membership from BSA Student Chapters. One of the requirements for the chapters is that the two primary officers are current BSA members. We were expecting this to continue to increase student membership from the 15 student chapter memberships in 2021. At this point in the implementation of the new requirements, we have had an increase to 21 chapter members.

In the last year, we have taken many steps to create opportunities for students to continue to engage them in the society and maintain membership:

- We continued to compile student resources in a <u>Google Doc</u> and actively interacted with student members via social media.
- The Early Career Professional Development Committee proposed by past Student Reps has been active and working on professional development events for our members.
 - They have fully taken over the GRFP workshop, and held an "Applying to Graduate School" both offered in Fall 2023

- The ECDC committee actively works with the Botany360 committee to provide year round events for all members
- Planning an upcoming coding workshop series that will continue into the workshop we and the ECDC are planning for Botany 2024
- The new committee application process took effect in the 2022 application season. This year, we continued to heavily advertise these positions to students through social media and the student newsletter.


BOTANY 2023 RECAP

Summary

The Botany 2023 conference student attendance was similar to pre pandemic numbers and Botany 2022, with 494 registered students. Students made up 43% of the total conference attendees, a percentage which has stayed consistent since 2019. There were fewer students who attended virtually (72 compared to 165 in 2022). These virtual attendees accounted for 15% of the total student attendance. While hybrid options are cheaper for student members, they seem to be less popular than in previous years.

General:

- 494 student attendees
- The percentage of graduate/undergraduate students attending the conference has grown and we hope to see that percentage get even larger!
- 24% (224) of abstracts were student submissions



Key takeaways:

• Students continue to make up a large percentage of conference attendees averaging at 41% of total attendees over the last five years. This means we must

- understand their conference needs to continue to serve this population and maintain their engagement in the conference.
- Almost half of all attending students presented at Botany 2023 (45% of student attendees). These percentages are smaller but similar to the virtual conference years and before (~ 55% general rate).
- It is still difficult to point to long term patterns using data regarding student attitudes toward hybrid meetings. Students in surveys mostly support hybrid meetings, but hybrid student attendance at Botany2023 was low.

Evaluating proposal to increase student participation in symposia and colloquia

In Spring 2021, the student reps recommended to the board that "starting with Botany 2022 we require all symposia and colloquia to include at least 1 student in their proposal to be approved and continue to encourage organizers to take into account the diversity, including the career stage diversity, of their speakers". We found an increase in student involvement in symposia and colloquia in 2022 and wanted to see if that trend continued in 2023.


The applications had varied information about the career stage or position of the proposed speakers, but we were able to identify student speakers and post-docs in 50% proposed sessions in 2022 and 92% of sessions for 2023. Out of the 75 speakers proposed for 2023, 19 were students and 14 were post-docs. The symposia/colloquia student participation decreased during the virtual conferences but is increasing now. Overall, it seems that more proposals are including at least one student speaker, with a third of them including multiple student speakers in 2023. We believe that it is important to continue to monitor student participation in colloquia/symposia and find ways to increase participation, as students make up such a high percentage of conference attendance and presentations.

Career in Botany Luncheon:

At the Careers in Botany
Luncheon, we had 12 panelists
with careers in academia,
government,
non-governmental
organizations, consulting
companies, herbaria, botanical
gardens and museums. They
represented the spectrum of
career stages, and collectively,



they work in five countries and ten US states. A total of 106 students attended; one of our best attended luncheons yet! <u>Profiles were added to Botany.org</u>.

Writing your CV & translating it into a public-facing website workshop:

Our first CV writing/website building workshop was a great success with 7 panelists and 12 attendees. The workshop panelists were a diverse group of plant scientists with experience in both CV building and Website management.



Student Social and Networking Event:

We had 143 students who attended the social (similar attendance to 2022). We had lots of positive feedback and we think these events were overall successful.



Botany 2022 Networking Board: For our conference Networking Board, we heard from 7 labs recruiting for more than 13 positions including masters and PhD student, research assistant, post-doc, and technician openings in 7 states across the country. We also heard from 18 early career researchers looking for graduate school positions, post-docs, jobs in industry, government, lab or field positions.

Student Chapter Meet-up:

We held our first ever Virtual Student Chapter Meet-up at the conference this year. The event was initiated and organized by our very active student chapters. We hope to continue events like these to help connect all of the Student Chapters.


