Student Registrations

The number of students registered was 473 as of June 11th, with 353 in person and 170 virtual registrations. This is a drop from the record 830 student registrations from last year. The registrations are on track to reach the numbers at the last in-person conference in 2019, when 497 students attended. Students make up 43% of total attendees, close to the student attendance percentages for 2019-2021.

 <u>Planting the Seeds of Science Communication Workshop</u> (July 24th, 10:00am -12:00pm) feat. Taran Lichtenberger, Molly Edwards, and Teressa Alexander as co-organizers

Where do we start when we want to share our science with our broader communities? Which social platform is the best medium for the topics we want to amplify to engage the audience we want to reach with our preferred style of communication? Join us for a two-hour workshop to:

- Meet a panel of plant science communicators who reach people through varied media and platforms: community outreach, museums & botanical gardens, social media, video, and writing

- BSA Student Chapters
 - We modified the application process and rules for maintaining a chapter in order to keep students connected with BSA.
 - Student chapters must have a Faculty Advisor. This person will help maintain the continuity of the chapter as students graduate and will help provide relevant resources for students. It is recommended for the advisor to be a current BSA member but it is not required.
 - Choose at least two student Officers: a President and Secretary/Treasurer. You can have more officers if you wish. These two primary officers, however, must have current BSA memberships. Officers will be able to take advantage of the Student Chapter membership rate of \$10 and can also work with the BSA office if financial aid is requested (email aneely@botany.org for either scenario.)
 - The President will be the primary contact for the BSA Office. The Secretary is responsible for forwarding BSA email communications (such as the monthly Newsletter) to the chapter members who are not current BSA members. Any Student chapter member that is a current BSA member will automatically receive BSA email communications.
 - Student Chapter Officers will be required to update BSA on any officer changes annually.
 - Student Chapters will be required to have at least two botany themed events per year. We would love to see you organize as many botanical activities as you want, but you are required to report two chapter events. These events are a great way to connect with your chapter around your interest in botany. Some activity ideas are field trips to a museum or botanical garden, hikes or field work in local plant habitats, attending plant science conferences or talks, organizing plant sales or swaps, organizing outreach events to engage the local community in botany, and volunteering to remove invasive species or replant native plants.

Proposal #1

This year we had four candidates up for Student Representative, two graduate students and two undergraduates. While we think the interest in this position is great, we are concerned about the time commitment for undergraduates. Part of the responsibility of being on the Board is attending multihour meetings throughout the two years as Student Rep. These meetings are either virtual during the week, or prior to COVID-19, scheduled in St. Louis. Undergraduates would likely have to skip class to attend these meetings and we should not encourage this. In addition, the Student Rep serves a population of both undergraduates and graduate students. An undergraduate rep may not be able to represent or anticipate the needs of graduate students, while a graduate student has had both of those experiences and can better speak for this broader audience. We propose to amend Article VII Section 3 of the Bylaws to include that students must be graduate students when applying for the Student Representative position.
